

As luck would have it, Brother Siscel was selected to become the Administrator of the New Hope Living & Learning Center of Waterloo, IL a home and school for severely handicapped children. This shift in professions took him in 1980 to a life & career changing move to the association management profession. In 1980 he became the Executive Vice President of the Plumbing Industry Council, and 2 other related industry organizations.

In 1990 he accepted a similar position with the Mechanical Contractors Association retiring from them on August 31, 2007. He then set up a consulting firm, JWS Services, LLC. During his association career he was elected a member of the Board of Directors of the American Society of Association Executives from 2000-2003. An active freemason since December 1967, he was also active in De Molay, serving as State Master Councilor. In the Masonic Fraternity he has received the 33" degree in 1985, and, if elected in June of 2016, will become Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons in MO. He was privileged to be elected to the Board of Directors of the Masonic Home of MO and served from 2006 to 2010.

A record of which Brother Siscel is most proud is his public service. Through appointment of the late Buzz Westfall, he served over 10 years on the Board of Trustees of the Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District from 1993-2003, serving as Chairman in 1996. Additionally, every Governor of Missouri from John Ashcroft through Jay Nixon has appointed him to significant leadership positions. In 1992 he was appointed to the Board of Regents of Harris Stowe State College, appointed to a full term by Mel Carnahan. Bob Holden appointed him to the MO Health & Educational Facilities Authority serving as its chairman In 2004, Matt Blant put him of the Baard of Governors of Truman State University Chairman 2011, & Jay Nixon appointed him as a Commissioner of the St. Louis County Board of Election Commissioners in 2012. Service like this has been gratifying set of activities to an equally active career, culminating with membership in St. Louis Lodge #5, IOOF.



# The Liberty and Union Flag



This flag was first flown on the town green by the citizens of Taunton, Massachusetts on October 19<sup>th</sup>, 1774. It is considered to be one of the very first of our American flags. It is based on a traditional British Red Ensign Flag, which was the official flag of Great Britain at the time, with the words "Liberty and Union" added on the bottom. A description of the flag was printed in the *Boston Evening Post* and it soon spread around the colonies. Their protests were against corrupt politicians, taxes, and laws that had been passed which they believed violated

their constitutional rights as British subjects. By raising the British Red Ensign, they showed that they were still loyal British subjects, but by adding "Liberty and Union," they declared that they wouldn't tolerate having their rights as British citizens violated. Those who hoisted the flag left the following inscription at the base of the pole:

"Be it known to the present, and to all future generations, that the Sons of Liberty in Taunton, fired with zeal for the preservation of their rights as men, and as American Englishmen, and prompted by a just resentment of the wrongs and injuries offered to the English Colonies in general, and to this Province in particular, through the unjust claims of a British Parliament, and the Machiavellian policy of their fixed resolution to preserve sacred and inviolate their birth-rights and charter-rights, and to resist, even unto blood, all attempts for their subversion or abridgment."

"Born to be free, we spurn the knaves who dare for us the chains of slavery to prepare. Steadfast, in freedom's cause, we'll live and die, unawed by Statesmen; foes to tyranny, but if oppression brings us to our graves, and marks us dead, she ne'er shall mark us slaves."

The above information was provided by Pete Cauchon, member of Heroes of '76, Flag Team, National Sojourners.

# Basic Computer Words: Network, Internet, & URL's



A "network" is two or more computers hooked together. When two computers are "networked," information can be moved from one computer to the other. Companies have many computers on their network, so employees can share information with each other.

The "Internet" is an "international network of networks," or a whole bunch of computers all over the world, connected together.

Your Internet Supplier (sometimes called your Internet Service Provider, or ISP), keeps their computers turned on all the time, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. They are a permanent part of the Internet. This way, whenever someone sends you an e-mail, it goes to their computer, where it is stored until you are ready for it. When you turn your computer on, and your computer connects to their computer, when you check your e-mail, the e-mail message goes the last part of its journey, to your computer.

Those "www.whatever.com" thingy's are called "Universal Resource Locators" or "URL's" for short.

When you use a "browser" program (like Microsoft Internet Explorer or Google), and you type in one of those "www.whatever.com" thingy's, your computer sends a request to the other computer, somewhere on the Internet (somewhere in the world). The other computer sends the "webpage" at that URL back to your computer, and you see it on your screen. Every time you click on another link (which is actually another URL); it requests another "page" of information from that new URL. That new page may be located on the same computer, or it may be located on a computer on the other side of the world.

Because all these computers on the Internet are connected together, when information is being sent from one place to another, it gets passed from computer to computer, till it gets where it is going. If one computer is not working, the information is "automatically" sent by another route. This is what makes the Internet so robust. If some computers are not working, it doesn't block the communication. The communication is just re-routed automatically.
