a place called St Louis, Missouri in a Cadillac. That was the biggest car I had ever seen, in those

days they were big and long.

We arrived in the middle of the night and boy was it cold. We stayed with relatives for a few months and attended a local school. I was placed in the third grade but it was hard to understand because I was 15 years old, I had to learn English. Everything was strange to us especially the language. It wasn't fun. We then moved our own home near Wellston, Mo. It was a neighborhood in transition and I got in a lot of fights while attending another grade school. A friend of mine got me a job at a corner grocery store for a Jewish couple, nice people. I delivered groceries and anything else that needed to be delivered. All during this time I was also slowly learning English. After about a year our family again moved to a neighborhood in south St Louis. Another grade school and by this time I was in the 7th grade. Eventually someone figured out that my brother and I were too old to be in grade schools so they transferred us to Roosevelt High School where we eventually graduated in 1963. It was here that I met Larry Sisco in 1959 in 4th hour choir class. We remained friends until he decided to go to a better place. After graduating from High School I attended two semesters at what was then the new St Louis Community college. It was their first year of operation and classes were being held at Roosevelt High at night. In 1964 my brother and I along with two friends enlisted in the United States Air Force. After training I spent some time with a SAC unit in Arkansas and was later sent to Tripoli, Libya. I really enjoyed my stay in Libya because there was a lot of Italians there who had stayed after the war. They sort of adopted me which was like being home again.

Looking back, I think that I actually met Colonel Khadafy while in Libya because during my tour, the US Air Force and the Libya Air Force shared the same Air Base. Since coming to the United States I have had the opportunity to return to my place of birth, and visit with my relatives and friends. Over the years, I have learned many things including a new language. I have made lifelong friends and even after my time in the military I have come back to St. Louis, Missouri because this is my home. After being discharged from the USAF and a couple of jobs I didn't like, I went to work for the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. By this time, I had three children, therefore work was a necessity. I worked for about 8 years in various capacities. One day a lifelong friend and I decided to go into the restaurant business, however neither one of us knew anything about the restaurant business. But we did not let that stop us; we borrowed money and purchased a restaurant from an old Sicilian couple. We kept the restaurant for about four years. After leaving the restaurant business I went to work for the Venture Stores; I lasted for about 12 years. The company was going under so I decided to go on a wild adventure to San Diego California to manage a new restaurant for a friend, it turns out that I was an outsider in a family business. I decided that it was time to come back home to St. Louis where I joined the Ryan's Steak House Company. I worked there for about 13 years, It was at this time, that my old friend Larry Sisco talked me into joining the IOOF.


ROBERTSON SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Bedford Flag

As a result of Brother Paul Revere's ride, the Minutemen gathered at Concord Bridge on April 19th, 1775, to face the British. This colorful banner waved over them; the arm and sword and the Latin motto "Conquer or Die" symbolized very well their determination to fight for home and liberty. This priceless relic is of the oldest of flags in the United

States. It had been made in England in the 17th century for use by the Three County Troop. This cavalry unit from eastern Massachusetts defended the Colonists against the Indians in the late 1600's. The square shape was typical of cavalry flags, known at that time as Cornets. Today, this flag can be viewed at Bedford, Massachusetts.


